3. Seek new activities for the Industrial Sponsors to support — Instrumentation Workshop?
4. Try to get Industrial Sponsor representatives more involved in their supported activities — perhaps by modifying organizational structure.
5. Make a new member drive for the Industrial Sponsors group when economic conditions are propitious.

11TH BIENNIAL SYMPOSIUM (E.J. VANDERBERG)

The 11th Biennial program is complete with only poster contributions still being solicited. Requests for information and registration forms are already coming in — mostly from the C&E News meeting calendar.

Our PRF request for \$3,000 was granted. This plus the **\$5,000 budgeted from Division funds** (recoverable from registration fee) will adequately cover our meeting expenses. In addition, du Pont, Continental Can and Dow each will contribute \$500 toward making the Mark reception and dinner at the Symposium an outstanding event. Everything points to a very successful Biennial.

NOMENCLATURE COMMITTEE (H.-G. ELIAS)

The Nomenclature Committee held a special meeting on November 17 and 18, 1981, in Columbus, Ohio, to discuss problems of basic polymer nomenclature. It is planned to publish notes on these problems in a polymer journal in order to solicit comments before recommendations are made. The Committee also completed a list of abbreviations for plastics, fibers, additives, etc. which will be published shortly.
